book, "Letting Go of Literary Whiteness: Antiracist Literature Instruction for White Students," which has been published by Columbia University's

Teachers College Press. The book is co-written by Carlin Borsheim-Black, an associate professor of English at Central Michigan University.

As the description of the work reads, "Rooted in examples from their own and others' classrooms, the authors offer discipline-specific practices for implementing antiracist literature instruction in White-dominant schools." Explored in the chapters are different aspects of anti-racist literature teaching and learning, including focuses on finding literature that highlights the perspectives of people of color and how to create assessments for racial literacy.

Sarigianides is a professor the coordinator of secondary English. She earned a Ph.D. in English education from the Teachers College of Columbia University. She also holds a master's degree from University of California, Irvine and a bachelor's degree from UCLA, where she graduated summa cum laude.
